Responsibilities: Works with funders and clients to form an empirical basis for their program and policy initiatives and to provide meaningful feedback for improvement and adaptation. Responsible for all aspects of research and program evaluation, including evaluation design and methodology, data management and analysis, presentations and report writing, technical assistance provision, staff oversight and coordination, and overall project management. Direct projects with respect to interdisciplinary and cross-sector collaborations, domestic violence prevention and intervention, substance use prevention and treatment, behavioral health and primary care integration, and services for at-risk and vulnerable populations.

Current Projects include:

- *Sargent Shriver Civil Right to Counsel Act Evaluation.* Principal Investigator for the evaluation of California Assembly Bill 590, which established nine pilot projects to provide legal services to low-income parties in civil matters involving critical livelihood issues, such as eviction (prevention of homelessness), child custody (often involving domestic violence allegations), and guardianships. Each project entails a collaboration between legal aid agencies and the local Superior Court. The evaluation involves a process study of all sites informed by key stakeholder interviews, site visits, client interviews, and deployment of a database to record service provision. Outcome and cost studies are occurring at six sites and involve either random assignment of litigants or the identification of matched comparison groups. Data are gathered from individual court case files, court administrative data, cost records, and client interviews.

- *Children Exposed to Domestic Violence—Specialized Response Programs.* Evaluation Director for this initiative, funded by California Children’s Justice Act, that provides grants to law enforcement agencies around the state to establish specialized response protocols for domestic violence incidents involving children, specifically by collaborating with local community-based domestic violence agencies and county-level child protective services. The evaluation examines both the implementation of the grants, exploring the structure and functioning of the specialized response programs, and the impact of the grant on the system’s response to violence-exposed children. In addition, NPC is providing technical assistance in the creation of cross-site database to facilitate services to families and to enhance cross-agency communication.
- *Family Recovery Program.* Project Director for a process, outcome, and cost evaluation of this family treatment court (or family dependency drug court) that provides intensive judicial oversight for substance-abusing parents of young children involved with the child welfare system. The intent of the FRP is to divert parents to substance abuse treatment and help them navigate the child welfare system, hopefully reunifying the family.
- *REACH Too Recovery Peer Mentoring Program.* Evaluation Director for this program, funded by the federal Center for Substance Abuse Treatment within SAMHSA, that offers addiction recovery peer mentoring services to adults engaged with a therapeutic court in Clark County, WA—including felony Adult Drug Court, Family Treatment Court, Substance Abuse Court (misdemeanor), and Veteran’s Court. A process and outcome evaluation separately examine the implementation and impact of this service enhancement for individuals engaged in the court system.
- *Oregon SBIRT Training Initiative.* Evaluation Director for this initiative, funded by the federal Center for Substance Abuse Treatment within SAMHSA, which aims to support the integration of behavioral healthcare in routine primary care by increasing the number of health professionals who can effectively carry out SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral to Treatment) practices in urban and rural medical settings throughout Oregon. The evaluation examines the development, implementation, and effectiveness of the training curriculum on learners across a variety of clinical disciplines and the incorporation such trainings into existing academic and professional programs.
- *Connecting Students to the World of Work.* Evaluation Director for this initiative, funded by the Oregon Arts Commission, to support projects that connect students to the professional arts work, build their skills, and foster an awareness of and motivation for college and career aspirations. Duties are twofold: (1) provide individualized evaluation-related technical assistance to each of the grantee programs with an eye toward capacity building, and (2) design and implement a cross-site evaluation of all 11 funded programs and presents findings to the OAC to be shared with the Oregon legislature in service of the State’s 40-40-20 goal for education.
- *Montana’s Partnerships for Success.* Evaluation Consultant for Montana KIDS Count at the University of Montana, which is carrying out the statewide evaluation of the PFS project, funded by the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention within SAMHSA, to employ the data-driven

Strategic Prevention Framework model to support and augment the state's substance use prevention infrastructure, bolster its capacity, and ultimately reduce and prevent the onset of alcohol and other drug misuse throughout the State.
