

Outcome Measures

- Disposition (reunification, TPR, etc.)
- Recurrence of child maltreatment
- Length of stay in out-of-home care
- Timeliness of reunification
- Increased visitation
- Prevention of substance-exposed newborns (In program)

- It takes work (and time) to get sharing to happen and be useful
- Develop a culture of exchanging information and using data
- Build relationships and work to decrease fear and risks

Data Quality – lessons learned

- Keep historical data about removals, days in foster care, placements, etc.
- Use the same variable/field for the same information
- Use common data elements for aggregating across sites (see handout)
- Share information back to the community

 - either resources themselves or funds to access them?



Technical Assistance – lessons learned

- Electronic data systems
- Capacity building
- Identifying family needs
- Connecting families to services
- Functional improvements
- Quality of services
- Retention



Outcomes

- Evaluation is important to help see trends and patterns – to see what makes a difference at the program level
- Data can help you tell a story, such as differences between people who graduated and those who didn't




Treatment completion

Significantly more FDTC program parents successfully completed treatment after program entry compared to parents who did not participate in the FDTC.

(JACKSON COUNTY, OREGON)

Percent of Parents who Successfully Completed a Treatment Episode




Note: Difference is significant at p < .01

Subsequent arrests

(JACKSON COUNTY, OREGON)

Drug court participants were re-arrested significantly less often than the comparison group over 4 years from drug court entry.






Note: Difference is significant at p < .01

Lessons Learned

- Plan for the time (quantity AND duration) it will take to access information
- Build relationships find out how the collaboration will benefit both parties
- Train program and data entry staff
- Think about what questions you want to answer and what information you need to answer them



Lessons Learned

- Look at your data at regular times see if you have missing or confusing information
- Use your data to inform program changes
