APPENDIX B: GLOSSARY OF ANALYSES, TERMS, AND DATA SOURCES

Glossary of Analyses, Terms, and Data Sources

Table 1:

<u>Birth rate:</u> The actual number of <u>resident</u> births recorded by Vital Statistics for the July 1, 2007 – June 30, 2008, fiscal year available for download as of October 2008. This number is a <u>proxy</u> for the number of screens a program may be able to conduct.

Birth rates reported here represent <u>first births</u> for all counties. Vital statistics information is recorded for the mother only.

Rate of Declines to Share Information: Information on families completing the NBQ but declining to share information with the evaluation team is collected by programs and submitted annually to the evaluation by the program managers.

<u>Total Families Screened</u>: Calculated by adding the number of resident first births screened (and send to the evaluation) with the number of families screened, but declining to share information with the evaluation.

<u>Screening Rate:</u> For a family to be included in the screening rate, programs must (1) submit the NBQ to the evaluation team in time to be included in the analyses (by October 15, 2008 for screens dated July 2007 through June 2008), <u>or (2)</u> have a screening date entered into the OCCF Family Manager data system by October 15, 2008. Screening rate is calculated by dividing the total number of families screened by the first birth rate.

It is possible that programs serving a high proportion of first time fathers and/or prenatal families may have a higher screening rate compared to their resident (mothers') births. Programs screening above 100% are capped at 100% for the purpose of these analyses.

Table 2:

<u>Total Families Offered Healthy Start</u>: Calculated by adding the number of families screened, number of families who declined HS information, number of families receiving information but declined screening, and number of families who signed a pre-consent but were not screened (see below).

<u>Percent of Eligible Births Offered Service</u>: Percent of total families offered healthy start, divided by the first birth rate for the fiscal year.

<u>Percent of Families Declining Screening:</u> Percent of families declining the NBQ divided by the number of families offered screening.

Number of Offered Families Screened: Calculated by adding the number of families screened (and sent to the evaluation) and the number of families screened but declined to share information with the evaluation (see Table 1).

but were not screened are submitted annually to the evaluation team by the Healthy Start Program Manager or Supervisor.

Table 3:

<u>Time to Screen:</u> The data for calculating "Time to Screen" comes from counting the number of days between the date of birth and the date of screen. These variables are taken from the NBQ. In the event the NBQ has not yet been submitted to the evaluation, the dates are taken from Family Manager. Prenatal screens are counted as zero days. Families with data missing on either date of birth or date of screen are not included in these analyses.

Table 4:

During FY 2007-08, a <u>high-risk screen</u> was defined as 2 or more risk factors on the NBQ <u>or</u> the single risk indicator for depression (Item 19) <u>or</u> the single risk indicator for substance use issues (Item 21). NBQs are typically completed either by the parent or by Healthy Start staff. A Spanish language version of the NBQ is available for those families preferring to read in that language.

Other risk factors (in addition to depression and substance use) include:

- Being a teen mother (age 17 or younger) (Item 7b)
- Being single (Item 13)
- Having prenatal care more than 12 weeks into pregnancy or not at all (Item 14a)
- Having less than 5 health care visits while pregnant (Item 14b)
- Having less than a high school diploma or GED (Item 15)
- Both mother and spouse/partner (if present) being unemployed (Items 16 and 17)
- Reporting difficulty paying for living expenses some/most of the time (Item 18)
- Having some or serious problems with family relationships (Item 20)

Table 5:

Information about mother's race/ethnicity is taken from Item 8 on the NBQ. Choices listed on the NBQ reflect any race/ethnicity in which there was at least 1% representation in any of Oregon's counties at the time the instrument was developed. Families identifying themselves as more than one race/ethnicity are considered by the evaluation team to be "Multiracial."

Table 6:

<u>Language</u>: Information on language spoken in the household is taken from Item 10 of the NBQ.

<u>Teen Mothers</u>: A teen mother is defined by Healthy Start as any mother who is age 17 or younger at the time of screen. Mother's age is taken either from Item 7b on the NBQ (your current age) or is calculated by comparing Item 7a (mother's date of birth) to the date of the screen, to calculate mother's age at the time of screening if Item 7b is left blank.

<u>Single Mothers:</u> Marital status is determined by mother's response to Item 13 on the NBQ. <u>Education Level:</u> Determined by mother's response to Item 15 on the NBQ.

Table 7:

<u>Health Insurance</u>: Information about health insurance at the time of screening is taken from Items 12a (for mothers) and 12b (for baby) on the NBQ.

<u>Prenatal Care</u>: Information on prenatal care received is taken from Items 14a and 14b on the NBQ.

Table 8:

Risk factors reported are taken from responses to the following items on the NBQ:

- Parents' employment is calculated by looking at both responses to Item 16 and 17 on the NBQ. Both parents need to be unemployed (or a single mother unemployed) in order for this Item to be counted as a risk factor.
- <u>Trouble paying for basic living expenses</u> is taken from responses to Item 18 on the NBO.
- Information about symptoms of <u>depression</u> is taken from responses to Item 19 on the NBQ.
- Information on alcohol and drug use is taken from Item 21 on the NBQ.
- Information about relationship issues is taken from Item 20 on the NBQ.

Table 9:

Those families who have a positive NBQ (at least 2 risk factors <u>or</u> the risk factor for depression <u>or</u> the risk factor for substance use) are counted as <u>eligible for Intensive</u> <u>Service</u>. A family eligible for service (in Table 4) may not be included in the total number eligible for Intensive Service in this table if information on offering/acceptance was missing from the NBQ.

Families <u>offered and accepted</u> services during FY 2007-08 are identified by program responses to Item D on the NBQ. Occasionally, a family originally declining service may decide later that they wish to receive service. Programs can serve these families based on program capacity; however individuals that fall into this scenario are not counted in the acceptance rate unless a revised NBQ was submitted.

Families <u>not offered</u> for "other" reasons are primarily those in one large program who were participating in a program similar to Healthy Start at the time of screening.

Table 10:

Number of Families Screened/Referred Only includes all families who had a screening date during FY 2007-08, and for whom the NBQ indicated the family was not eligible (negative screen) or indicated the family declined or was not offered Intensive Service. This count also includes families who originally accepting Intensive Service on the NBQ, but later had an exit form submitted indicating the family never received a first home visit.

<u>Newly Enrolled Intensive Service families</u> includes all families who had a screening date during FY 2007-08, and for whom the NBQ form indicating the family accepted Intensive Service plus those families for whom a Family Intake or other evaluation form suggesting a home visit occurred was submitted.

Continuing Intensive Service families includes all families who enrolled in Intensive Service in a prior fiscal year, and did not have an exit form with a last home visit or creative outreach end date prior to FY 2007-08.

Table 11:

<u>Families accepting Intensive Service and receiving a first home visit</u> is calculated by comparing the number of families who have NBQs indicating "Accepted Intensive Service" compared with the number of Family Intakes submitted. In the event a Family Intake was not submitted, but the family has other evaluation data indicating visits took place, the assumption was made that the family had a first home visit and is included in the analyses.

Information on <u>families not receiving a first home visit</u> is taken from reasons on the Exit Form. However, families coded with one of these reasons, but who also had other evaluation data submitted suggesting they had received a first home visit, were counted as having received a first home visit.

New Intensive Service <u>families receiving their first home visit prenatally</u> or within 3 months of the birth of the baby is calculated by subtracting the date of the first home visit (from Item 1 on the Family Intake) from the baby's date of birth (taken from the NBQ or Family Manager, as appropriate). If the date of the first home visit on the Family Intake is missing, and a first home visit date is on an exit form for that family, the first home visit on the exit form is substituted. If the first home visit date is still missing, the date of the Family Intake form is substituted.

Healthy Start program managers submit home visit information by Home Visitor to the evaluation team monthly. The evaluation team compiles the <u>rate of expected home visits</u> using Healthy Families America standards that state that families should receive 75% or more of the expected visits, given their level of services. The percentage of families who meet this criterion is reported.

Tables 12 - 15:

Demographic information on Intensive Service families is taken from items reported on the NBQ (see Tables 5-8 above for source of data).

Tables 16 & 17:

<u>Kempe risk factors</u> are taken from the Kempe Inventory Form. Items on the Kempe form are rated by the worker as: 0 (not applicable) 5 (mild) or 10 (severe). Data reported here is the highest rating on a given item for either parent.

Table 18 & 19:

Families <u>offered</u> service are those whose NBQ indicated <u>both</u> a positive (high risk) score and who were offered service (Item D, excluding (1) not offered, caseload full, (2) not offered, unable to contact, and (3) not offered, other). Counts of <u>accepted service</u> are indicated on the NBQ, Item D. Demographics of families accepting Intensive Service are taken from the NBQ.

Table 20 A:

Retention was calculated using the HFA recommended analysis strategy. Specifically, we take a sample of families enrolled during a given period in the past, and report on their retention in the program at subsequent intervals. For these analyses, families enrolled in FY 2005-06 were selected, as this provided adequate time to be able to look at 3, 6, 12, 18 and 24-month retention periods. All families who were enrolled in Intensive Services (specifically, who received a first home visit or had a Family Intake form submitted during FY 2005-06) were included in the retention analysis. However, families with an exit form indicating "moved" or "deceased" as an exit reason were not included in these analyses.

Table 20 B:

For these analyses, families enrolled in FY 2006-07 were selected, as this provided adequate time to be able to look at a 3, 6, and 12-month retention period. All families who were enrolled in Intensive Services (specifically, who received a first home visit or had a Family Intake form submitted during FY 2006-07) were included in the retention analysis. However, families with an exit form indicating "moved" or "deceased" as an exit reason were not included in these analyses.

Tables 21 & 22:

Demographic descriptions of "retained" families are based on responses to the NBQ from families enrolled during the 2006-07 fiscal year who remained in the program for 12 months or longer.

Table 23:

<u>Number of exiting families</u> is determined by those exit forms submitted with an exit date during FY 2007-08. Exit dates are based on creative outreach end dates, or the date of the last home visit (if there is no creative outreach period indicated). If both of those dates are missing, the date of the exit form is used.

Average age at exit is determined by calculating the age of the child at the time of exit, using the birth date (from the NBQ) and the exit date (see exit date calculation above).

<u>Reasons for participants exiting the program</u> are based on Healthy Start workers' reports, as indicated on the Exit Form.

Other reasons include: parent in jail, child removed from custody, child deceased, concerns about FSW safety, parent no longer interested, parent too busy, and family transferred to another program. Programs were also given the option to describe reasons not listed on the exit form under "other."

Tables 24 - 26:

Health care information comes from the most recently received Family Update.

- Parent's primary health care provider information: Item 30
- Child's primary health care provider information: Item 29
- Well-child check up information: Item 21
- Child's health insurance information: Item 22

• Emergency room use: Item 24

• Immunization information: Item 20a

Analyses describing <u>children lacking health insurance</u> on the NBQ but having it at the most recent follow-up are determined by comparing Item 12b on the NBQ to Item 22 on the Family Update, for that group of children who had both pieces of information present.

Analyses describing the percentage of <u>children immunized by age two</u> examine the response to Item 20a on the Family Update only for those children who are 2 years of age (by comparing the child's birth date to the date of the most recent Family Update form).

Table 27 A &B

Differences in select outcomes were examined for families receiving prenatal or postnatal service. Prenatal service families are those families who were both screened prenatally and began intensive service prenatally (as determined by the first home visit date occurring before the birth of the baby). Postnatal service families are those families who began intensive service after the birth of the baby (the first home visit date is after the baby's date of birth).

Early prenatal care is determined by item 14a on the NBQ and item 23 on the Family Intake.

Other outcomes are taken from the family intake form including:

- Smoking during pregnancy (item 16),
- Child having a health care provider (item 19),
- Mothers breastfeeding (item 21)
- Premature births (item 10).

Table 28:

Comprehensive prenatal care for the initial and subsequent pregnancies is based on the mother receiving <u>BOTH</u> early (1st trimester) and comprehensive (5 or more checkups) prenatal care (Items 14a and 14b on the NBQ, and Item 32b on the Family Update).

Only mothers indicating they are currently pregnant with a subsequent pregnancy (on Item 32 of the Family Update), and who have information on subsequent prenatal care, are included in the analyses.

Table 28 - 31:

ASQ and ASQ-SE developmental assessments are administered by home visitors as early as 4 months of age, however the earliest the information is reported to the evaluation is on the 6 month Family Update. In order to be included in the "eligible for screening" data, children had to be at least 6 months old, and therefore to be eligible to have a Family Update form completed.

If Family Updates indicated the child's development was being tracked by early intervention or that the child was receiving early intervention services, the family was given credit for having a screening even if there was no screening information on the

Family Update. This is because home visitors are not required to do the developmental assessment if the child is receiving developmental services through Early Intervention.

The Home Visitor reports information on child's <u>developmental status</u> (normal, delays indicated, other) on the Family Update form (Items 37b and 38b).

Children with confirmed developmental delays are reported on the Family Update (Item 34).

Receipt of Early Intervention services (related to ASQ) is reported on the Family Update (Item 36).

Referrals/connections to other services (related to ASQ-SE) is reported on the Family Update (Item 38c)

Table 32:

Connecting the family to needed resources is taken from information reported by the home visitor on the 6-month Family Update (Item 11). Specifically, workers who indicated "Yes" on the question "Did anyone in the family lack the needed service since the Family Intake" have those families included in analyses. Families were included in the analysis if the worker indicated that they lacked the given service and if there was a response to the follow-up question, "Did you connect any family members to the needed service." Only families with responses to both parts of the question are included in the analyses.

Table 33:

<u>Family outcomes and life events</u> are taken from the most recent Family Update responses to Items 13 and 19.

Table 34:

<u>Parenting skills</u> and ability to help child learn are taken from Items 11 and 12 on the Parent Survey A. Parents are asked to rate "Your knowledge of how children grow and develop," "Your confidence that you know what is right for your child" and "Your ability to help your child learn" at both 6 and 12 months compared to when their baby was born. Data in this report describe the increases in these skills at the two time periods (6 months and 12 months) compared to when the baby was born.

Table 35:

Measures of <u>Parent-Child Interaction</u> are obtained from parent self-report on the Parent Survey II, Part A. Parents report the frequency of four activities (sing songs, tell stories, read/look at books, and play games) "a few times a week," "about once a day" or "more than once a day".

<u>Parenting Stress</u> reduction is determined by comparing responses on the short form of the Parenting Stress index, consisting of 4 items ("I find myself giving up more of my life to meet my child's needs than expected," "I feel trapped by my responsibilities as a parent," "Since having a baby, I am almost never able to do things that I like to do," and "Having a baby has caused more problems than I expected in my relationships") on a 5-point scale

of Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagree. A change in score from parent's baseline (Parent Survey I) stress to 6 month Parent survey is calculated.

<u>HOME</u> information is taken from workers' in-home observation of the home environment. Percentages for "good" or higher refer to families with total scores on the HOME reaching the 75th percentile or higher (above average) for the normative population as established by the tools and developers (Bradley & Caldwell, 1984).

The home visitor reports information on families <u>reading to their child</u> 3 or more times a week on Item 42 of the HOME inventory.

Table 36:

Ratings of <u>staff cultural competency</u> are assessed by most recent parent responses (averaged) on the Parent Survey II, Part B. Items include, "My home visitor has helped me to think about my culture, family traditions, religious beliefs and/or values," "My home visitor has respected my family's culture, traditions, and religious beliefs and/or values," and "My home visitor has used or given me materials and information in my primary language" rated as "Yes," "No" or "Not Sure."

Ratings of <u>staff strengths orientation</u> are assessed by most recent parent responses (averaged) on the Parent Survey II, Part B. Items ask about the extent to which the home visitor has "Helped me to see strengths in myself I didn't know I had," "Helped me to use my own skill and resources to solve problems," "Worked together with me to meet my needs," "Helped me to see that I am a good parent," and "Encouraged me to think about my own personal goals and dreams" rated as "Yes," "No" or "Not Sure." These items are taken from the Strengths-Based Practices Inventory (Green & Tarte, 1999).

Table 37:

Ratings of home visitor helpfulness are taken from the family's last completed Parent Survey II, Part B, asking whether Healthy Start has helped with any of the following issues: getting food, clothing, housing or transportation; information on parenting and child growth/development; opportunities to meet other parents; feeling depressed, stressed or losing your temper; and going back to school, job training, or finding a job rated as "Yes," "No," or "We don't need help from visitor." Percentages reflect those families reporting their home visitor helped with those issues.

Tables 38 & 39:

Tables 38 & 39 summarize performance indicators defined by the Healthy Start Research, Steering, and Advisory Committees for 2007-08. These indicators are reported in prior tables, with the exception of Service Delivery Indicator #6: Percent of Expected Adequate Enrollment. This is calculated based on the information provided to all programs by OCCF that defined "Adequate Enrollment" as 25% of the three-year average of the number of first births born in 2003, 2004, and 2005. Specifically, the total number of Intensive Service families served during 2007-08 is divided by the defined "Expected Adequate Enrollment". For example, if County A served 50 families in Intensive Services, and the average number of first births born in County A for 2003, 2004, and 2005 was 200, then County A served 100% of their expected enrollment (50/(200*25%)).
